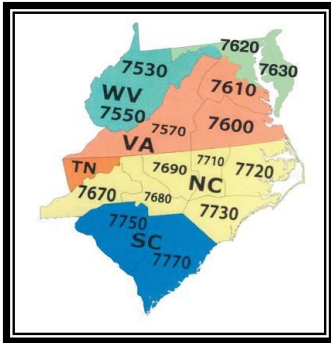

Follow-up Information

- **Seven changes to the FVP Pilot Plan** announced and implemented:
 - Numerous changes to the temporary online system to make it easier to use
 - Expanding the definition of Disease Prevention & Treatment to include injuries which if left untreated would lead to disease
 - Allowing a contingency fund in district grant spending plans of up to 20%
 - Eliminating the requirement that scholars provide proof of language testing to the Foundation
 - Eliminating the requirement that scholars be hosted by the district where their study institution is located provided that scholars live in their host district
 - Eliminating the requirement that members of the second vocational training team be identified at the time of application for global grants that propose an exchange of teams
 - Allowing pilot districts to use the Ambassadorial Scholarships program during the first year of the pilot to make the transition easier
- **The Rotary Foundation District Service Award.** Nominators: District governors
Deadline: Ongoing. Each recipient is given a certificate, awarded at the district level. District governors may obtain up to 20 blank certificates at no cost to their district. After the awards have been presented, districts are to record the names of the recipients in their own database. District officers should contact RI staff for historical records of District Service Award recipients.

Among alumni who give generously to The Rotary Foundation (as of March 31), 592 are Major Donors, who each have contributed \$10,000 or more, and 26 are members of the Arch C. Klumph Society, which honors people who contribute \$250,000 or more. Alumni have contributed more than \$533,000 to the Annual Programs Fund and over \$183,000 to Rotary’s US\$200 Million Challenge for polio eradication.
